Founded 35 years ago by Chris' father, John, the Cal Box Group of companies consists of five plants serving the industrial and consumer products marketplace. The plants all have different names, such as Cal Box I and II, CB Sheets Inc., Tucson Container Corp., Arizona Corrugated Container Co. and West Texas Container, and all operate as separate profit centers. Total combined square footage is close to 700,000. The company employs more than 300 people.

Fusion Paperboard To Close CT Mill

Versailles, Connecticut based Fusion Paperboard on July 23 filed paperwork with the Connecticut Department of Labor saying it would close its Sprague, Connecticut, paperboard mill on September 22, 2014. The mill produces 100 percent recycled, food-grade paper-

The Connecticut Labor Department's web site shows that Fusion Paperboard submitted a Federal WARN Act Notice that indicated 145 workers would be affected on the layoff date

"Despite recent efforts, the operation can no longer be sustained," said Joel Laroche, Chief Operating Officer of Fusion Paperboard in a news release. "We will make every effort to fulfill existing orders and help customers as they transition to alternate suppliers."

The website of local media outlet The Day noted the state's Department of Economic and Community Development would require Fusion Paperboard to repay a \$3 million low-interest state loan with a \$150,000 penalty.

According to a Connecticut Departof Economic Development (DECD) spokesperson, agreements typically require businesses to maintain op-

KapStone Reports Progress On 2020 Sustainability Goals

Northbrook, Illinois based KapStone Paper and Packaging Corporation recently released its 2013 sustainability report, which shows significant progress toward its 2020

sustainability goals. These goals, which were set based on the company's commitment to social responsibility, extend well beyond applicable laws and regulations mandated by federal, state, and local governmental entities.

The report conforms to rigid and voluntary standards defined by the Global Reporting Initiative (GRI) and uses company performance reported in 2010 as the baseline.

"We are proud of the fact that we are setting the bar high for ourselves in categories that are of importance to our customers and society in general," said KapStone Paper and Packaging Corporation President, Matt Kaplan. "We are committed to doing the right thing for our customers, our planet, our people, and the communities where we operate. In the category of people and community, the company reports a 37 percent reduction in workforce in juries since 2010, which is more than 50 percent of its 2020 goal.
